Inclusive Vocational Carpentry Training Benefits Four Fijian Villages

A seven-week Vocational Carpentry Training program was successfully conducted in Northern Vanualevu, benefitting 20 participants from four different communities: Cawaro, Qaraniwai Village, Nabubu Village, and Naua Village.

In collaboration with the Fiji National University - National Training Productivity Council, the training covered a wide range of topics essential for carpentry work such as interpreting plans, using hand power tools, interpreting basic footing design, constructing timber floor and wall systems, and constructing timber roof frames, among other theory and practical concepts. The theory and practical knowledge is enabling individuals to build household and community level resilience through climate safe housing.

We understand that rural communities often face challenges in accessing quality education and training opportunities. As a result, we take the training right to their doorstep overcoming the barriers of distance and limited access.

The Turaga Ni Koro (Village Head) said that the "Cawaro Village feels immensely fortunate to have hosted the vocational training, with the majority of students attending from our community. The skills they've gained will play a crucial role in the village's development, as well as benefiting the broader Tikina." Amongst the trainees, we had four women participants as well.

Supported by Habitat for Humanity New Zealand and the NZ Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade (MFAT), the training program is making a significant contribution to reducing the skills gap in the construction sector.

Building Capacity of Water Committee on Remote Island

In a significant step towards ensuring sustainable water management, 16 residents of Avea Village in Vanuabalavu, recently completed a three-day Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WaSH) training. This initiative aimed at equipping community members with the necessary skills to maintain and improve their water systems.

During the training, the Avea Water Committee underwent a strategic restructuring, forming three specialized teams: Operation and Maintenance, Inspection, and Promotion. Each team was tasked with critical roles including ensuring safe water practices, maintaining the water system, raising funds for post-disaster recovery, and enhancing reporting and record-keeping mechanisms.

Senitiki Raikoti, President of the Avea Water Committee, shared his enthusiasm: "I am so moved by the training, especially the installation of our reservoir component. Learning about the different fittings, brands, specifications, and purposes of each component has been incredibly valuable. This knowledge will be crucial for the operation and maintenance of our water system, both during normal times and in post-disaster scenarios."

This training marks a pivotal moment for Avea Village, as it enhances the technical skills of its residents and fosters a sense of ownership and responsibility towards their water resources.

The training was supported by the New Zealand High Commission.

- Selfless Fiji, a youth led organization that coordinates volunteer activities throughout the country.

These partnerships signify a collaborative effort to address housing and community development challenges in Fiji, and we look forward to engaging with more organizations to leverage resources and expertise to make a positive impact on the lives of those in need.
